This early brick has been incorrectly labeled Gothic Revival because of triangular shaped upper sashes with triangular panes in the gable dormers. These unusual dormers and the steeply pitch roof are more probably related to motifs found in Bavarian hunting lodges. Other important, but not so emphatic, are Greek Revival details.

The front (west) facade is symmetrical. However, the front door is in the asymmetrical north facade. Two tall windows in the west facade covered by a one story full facade porch supported by round wooden columns with Tuscan capitals. Dentils in the porch cornice. North facade has centrally placed trabeated doorway covered by small Greek Revival porch. Gable end in second story to right of front door has two small windows topped by triangular shaped transoms with trangular panes. Dentils in the gable end above these windows. Two gable dormers with triangular upper sashes with triangular panes in the longitudinal section of north facade. Windows are 3/3 and 2/2. Inside end chimneys.
